

Dunning Prize of \$300 awarded in the even-numbered years for a monograph on any subject relating to American history. The Robert Livingston Schwier Prize of \$100 awarded every five years for the best work in modern British and Commonwealth history (next award, 1961). The Watenull Prize of \$500 awarded biennially for a work on the history of India originally published in the United States (next award, 1960).

DUES: There is no initiation fee. Annual dues are \$7.50, students \$4.00. Life membership is \$150. All members receive the American Historical Review and the program of the annual meeting.


