# GENERAL INFORMATION

**HEADQUARTERS:** The Conrad Hilton Hotel, 720 South Michigan Boulevard, Chicago 5, Illinois (Telephone: WAbash 2-4400). At the headquarters hotel fifteen hundred rooms are available for members of the American Historical Association at these rates: single rooms, \$9.00; double rooms for two people, \$12.00; twin-bed rooms, \$15.00; suites \$25.00 and up. Because many other groups meet in Chicago during the same time as the Annual Meeting, correspondence regarding accommodations should be directed to The Conrad Hilton at the earliest possible date. A reservation form is enclosed with this program.

**REGISTRATION:** The registration desk in the Williford Room, Parlor A, will be open on Thursday, December 27, from 2 until 9 p.m.; Friday, December 28, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; Saturday, December 29, from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Sunday, December 30, from 9:30 a.m. until noon. The registration fee is \$1.50. The registration badge for admittance to sessions and all tickets for luncheons and dinners listed in this program may be obtained at the registration desk. *There will be no advance registration.* Members are asked to fill out in advance the enclosed registration form and present it with the proper fees at the registration desk immediately upon arrival.

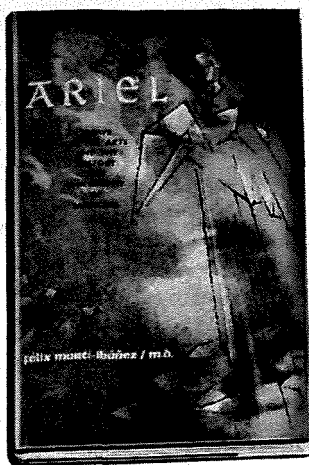

This lucid, scholarly new work examines the story of Russia's past in a manner that shows the author's thorough acquaintance with both primary sources and the major interpretive work on the subject, including that of Soviet historians. Comprehensive and up-to-date, the book is ideally suited for use as a basic text. The organization is basically chronological, with chapters divided topically into discussions of political history, economics, society and institutions, and religion and culture. Thirty-two pages of illustrations and thirty maps of excellent quality further increase the value of the text. An extensive, detailed bibliography provides a wide range of source materials as well as data about the background and major field of interest of each author listed.

Following a general introduction, the book is divided into five parts: Kievan Russia; Appanage Russia; Muscovite Russia; Imperial Russia; and Soviet Russia. The author writes with thorough knowledge of every period of Russian history and maintains a careful balance between the political, economic, social, diplomatic, and cultural aspects of the history. Major interpretations of crucial problems are presented as fully as possible so that the student may have the opportunity of exercising his own critical judgment. The work conveys a feeling for the complexity of Russian history and the historical debate connected with it, and provides a superb background for any student in the field.

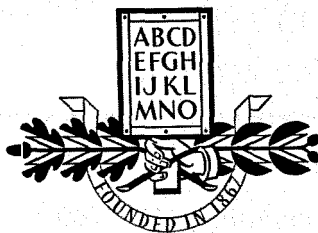

Dunning Prize* of \$300 awarded in the even-numbered years for a monograph on any subject relating to American history. The *Littleton-Griswold Prize in Legal History* of \$500 to be awarded biennially for the best published work in the legal history of the American colonies and the United States to 1900. The *Robert Livingston Schuyler Prize* of \$100 awarded every five years for the best work in modern British and Commonwealth history (next award, 1966). The *Watumull Prize* of \$500 awarded biennially for a work on the history of India originally published in the United States (next award, 1962).

**DUES:** There is no initiation fee. Annual regular dues are \$10.00, student \$5.00, and life \$200. All members receive the *American Historical Review* and the program of the annual meeting.

## American Association for State and Local History One Thousand Dollar Prize and Grant-in-Aid Program

FOR: *significant research projects in local history*

The American Association for State and Local History has established an annual prize and a grant-in-aid program to encourage the study, writing and publication of sound, interpretive local history.

### TERMS OF THE PRIZE

The Association will award \$1,000 to the author of the unpublished, book-length manuscript in local history that, in the opinion of its Research and Publication Committee, makes the most distinguished contribution to United States and Canadian historiography.

Only manuscripts of sound scholarship, genuine significance and stimulating interpretation will be considered. A revised doctoral or master's dissertation is eligible only if recommended in writing by the professor under whom it was written. Manuscripts must be submitted by October 15.

The author's acceptance of the award will convey to the Association publication rights. The prize manuscript and other meritorious manuscripts approved by the Research and Publication Committee will be published by the University of North Carolina Press.

### TERMS OF GRANT-IN-AID

In conjunction with the American Association for State and Local History prize, the Association has established a grant-in-aid program for significant *research* projects in local history. Grants made under this program will be limited to necessary travel expenses, photocopy and clerical assistance and similar items, specifically excluding compensation in lieu of salary. Doctoral candidates are not eligible for these grants. The president of the Association will make the awards on recommendation of the Research and Publication Committee. Applicants for the grant-in-aid program are requested to submit the proper forms no later than October 15.
