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

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GENERAL INFORMATION

HEADQUARTERS: All sessions listed in the *Program*, A.H.A. offices, and all exhibits will be in the New York Hilton, 1335 Avenue of the Americas at W. 53rd Street.

Fifteen hundred rooms have been reserved at the New York Hilton. In addition, approximately 2,000 rooms have been reserved at eight hotels nearby. Locations, rates, and more detailed instructions are given on the enclosed Hotel Reservation form. All room reservations will be arranged by the A.H.A. Housing Bureau operated by the New York Convention and Visitors Bureau. Please do not apply directly to the hotel.

REGISTRATION: There will be no advance registration for the Meeting. The registration badge for admittance to sessions and tickets for the luncheons and dinner listed in this *Program* may be obtained at the registration desk. The registration desk will be in the Second Floor Promenade (reached by escalators from the lobby) of the New York Hilton. It will be open Tuesday, December 27, from 3 p.m. until 10 p.m.; Wednesday, December 28, from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m.; Thursday, December 29, from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.; and Friday, December 30, from 8:30 a.m. until 12:30 p.m.

Members are asked to fill out the enclosed registration form in advance and present it with proper fees at the registration desk immediately upon arrival. The registration fee is \$1.50. Checks will be accepted if made out to the American Historical Association for the exact cost of registration and meal tickets. No refunds can be made.

LUNCHEONS AND DINNERS: All luncheons are priced at \$5.85, and the dinner of the Mediaeval Academy of America at \$8.50, including gratuities. Tickets desired should be indicated on the enclosed registration form and purchased at the time of registration. Because the Association must give advance notice to the hotel regarding the number to be served at each luncheon and the Academy dinner, the early purchase of tickets is essential.

LOCATOR FILE: Names of registered members in attendance and their local addresses while at the Meeting will be available at the Locator File adjacent to the Registration Desk in the Second Floor Promenade.

PROFESSIONAL REGISTER: Throughout the Annual Meeting, the Professional Register will be in operation on the fifth floor of the New York Hilton Hotel, P. G. Wodehouse and O. Henry Suites.
