Here is the tumultuous story of the Spanish periodical press — from its beginnings in 1470, through five centuries of Spain's stormy history, to the "moment of truth" reached under Franco's new, "liberal" Ley de Prensa e Imprenta (Press and Print Law) of 1966 — told by a former United Press International bureau chief and correspondent headquartered in Madrid. Mr. Schulte, now professor of journalism at Pennsylvania State University, combines scholarly research, a newsman's instinct, and a wealth of firsthand information in tracing the development of Spain's Fourth Estate, evaluating its interaction with other parts of the country's political-social order, and assessing its outlook for the future. ### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

LOCATION: All sessions listed in the *Program* will be in the Royal York Hotel on Front Street at York, or in the King Edward Sheraton Hotel on King Street just east of Yonge Street. The Professional Register will be in the Lord Simcoe Hotel on King Street at University Avenue. The headquarters and exhibits will be in the Royal York Hotel.

Twelve hundred rooms have been reserved at the Royal York, six hundred at the King Edward, five hundred fifty at the Lord Simcoe, and eight hundred rooms at three other hotels and one motel. Locations, rates, and more detailed instructions are given on the enclosed hotel registration form. All room reservations will be arranged by the Convention and Tourist Bureau of Metropolitan Toronto. Please do not apply direct to the hotel.

TORONTO INFORMATION: There are ample plane, train, and bus connections between Toronto and all centers of population on the continent, but at peak periods many of these may be booked to capacity and consequently it will be advisable to make early reservations.

American currency is generally acceptable in Canada but visitors from the United States are advised to change it for Canadian money at a bank on arrival in order to get the full premium to which they are entitled. While payments at the registration desk may be made in either currency, it will be impossible to allow the premium on American dollars because this would create too great a delay in registration.

American citizens do not need passports to enter Canada but they should carry some form of identification. Naturalized citizens should carry documentary evidence of their citizenship. Visitors to the United States in possession of a single entry visa should check with the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service before leaving the United States.

ASSOCIATED MEETINGS: Several other historical associations are meeting in Toronto in conjunction with the American Historical Association. The Canadian Historical Association is meeting jointly with the A.H.A. in the Royal York and King Edward Hotels with its registration in the King Edward Hotel. The Society for the History of Technology and the History of Science Society are meeting in the Westbury Hotel on Yonge Street above Carlton. The American Catholic Historical Association and the American Society for Church History will hold most of their meetings in the King Edward Hotel; the former will register in the Royal York, the latter in the King Edward.

A.H.A. REGISTRATION: There will be no advance registration for the meeting. The registration badge for admittance to sessions and tickets for luncheons and the dinner listed in this *Program* may be obtained at the registration desk, located in the Convention Lobby on the Convention Floor of the Royal York. It will be open on Wednesday, December 27, from 3:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m.; on Thursday, December 28, from 8:00 a.m. until 6:00 p.m.; on Friday, December 29, from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.; and on Saturday, December 30, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Please fill out the enclosed registration form in advance and present it with a fee of \$2.00 at the registration desk. Members are urged to make all payments in Canadian currency since it will be impossible to allow the premium on American bills or checks at the registration desk.

MEAL MEETINGS: All luncheons are priced at \$4.25 (Canadian) and the dinner of the Mediæval Academy at \$6.00 (Canadian) including gratuities. Tickets desired should be indicated on the enclosed registration form and purchased at the time of registration. Because the Association must give advance notice to the hotel regarding the number to be served at each meal, the early purchase of tickets is essential.

LOCATOR FILE: Names of registered members in attendance and their local addresses while at the meeting will be available at the Locator File in the Convention Lobby of the Royal York.

INFORMATION DESKS AND BULLETIN BOARDS: These will be located in the convention lobbies of both the Royal York and King Edward Hotels.


GROUP MEETINGS AND REUNIONS: Some historical societies and groups have arranged special meetings or receptions which cannot be listed in the *Program*. Mimeographed announcements concerning them will be distributed at the information desks, provided they are supplied to the Local Arrangements Chairman, Professor J. B. Conacher, Department of History, University of Toronto.

Information concerning group reunions such as smokers and breakfasts will be posted on the bulletin boards. All groups desiring to hold gatherings should make arrangements with the catering departments of the Royal York, King Edward, or Lord Simcoe Hotels, sending a copy of the correspondence to the Local Arrangements Chairman at the above address, or, after December 15, c/o American Historical Association, Royal York Hotel.

PROFESSIONAL REGISTER: Throughout the Annual Meeting, the Professional Register will be in operation on the lower floor of the Lord Simcoe Hotel, Salons B and C. Candidates may join the Register or bring their papers up to date at the meeting, if they have not already done so by mail. Prospective employers may review the Register's vita files, and they may also have their staff needs posted. Departmental representatives will further facilitate matters if they notify the Professional Register before the Annual Meeting, by December 11, of their hiring needs.

Candidates and employers alike should list their local addresses with the Professional Register as soon as they arrive in Toronto, because the Register will make every effort to expedite the interviewing process.

Candidates must be A.H.A. members before joining the Register; they pay an initial fee of \$3, with an annual renewal of \$1. The services of the Register are available to employers without charge. 

# THE MAKING OF MODERN MAN

From The Renaissance To The Present

By Louis L. Snyder, The City University of New York

This is a basic text covering the development of Western civilization from 1500 to the present day. The book stresses the economic, social, political, cultural, religious, and psychological approaches to historical understanding. The author treats in detail what he calls "the 'isms' of modern time"—absolutism, conservatism, romanticism, nationalism, liberalism, socialism, imperialism, and racialism.

The book is divided into seven parts; each part opens with an Era Theme, an introductory essay by such outstanding authorities as Toynbee, Bossuet, McIlwain, and Mill. 

The John H. Dunning Prize of \$300 awarded in the even-numbered years for a monograph on any subject relating to American history. The Clarence H. Haring Prize of \$500 awarded every five years to that Latin American who has published the most outstanding book in Latin American history during the preceding five years (next award, 1971). The Littleton-Griswold Prize in Legal History of \$500 awarded biennially for the best published work in the legal history of the American colonies and the United States to 1900 (next award, 1968). The Robert Livingston Schuyler Prize of \$100 awarded every five years for the best work in modern British and Commonwealth history (next award, 1971). The Watumull Prize of \$500 awarded biennially for a work on the history of India originally published in the United States (next award, 1968).






