The 130th annual meeting of the Association will be held January 7–10, 2016 in Atlanta. More than 1,500 scholars will participate in the four-day meeting. In addition, more than 50 specialized societies and organizations have scheduled sessions and luncheons in partnership with the Association. AHA awards and honors will be announced on Thursday, January 7 followed by the plenary session. Vicki L. Ruiz, University of California, Irvine, will deliver the presidential address on Friday, January 8.

#### Hotel Accommodations

The hotels were built in the 1960s through 1980s and designed by neofuturist architect and developer John C. Portman, known for hotels organized around a central atrium with glass elevators.

Be aware that there is only one set of restrooms per meeting floor.

#### Skybridge

A pedestrian skybridge connects the second floor of the Hilton Atlanta to the Marquis level of the Atlanta Marriott Marquis. Another skybridge connects the Atrium level of the Marriott to the lobby level at the Hyatt Regency Atlanta.

#### Making a Hotel Reservation

After preregistering for the annual meeting, attendees will receive an e-mail confirmation of their registration that will include information on how to make a standard room or suite reservation. Attendees will be able to make reservations by clicking on customized links or calling toll-free numbers provided in the confirmation e-mail. Attendees interested in reserving suites should consult the AHA's website (www.historians.org/annual-meeting/hotels-and-travel) or contact the hotels for more information about suite types and rates.

#### **Credit Card Guarantee**

All reservations must be guaranteed with a major credit card or deposit of one night's room rate and taxes. Cancellations must be made 72 hours prior to the scheduled arrival date or hotels will charge a cancellation fee of one night's room and tax.

#### **Cutoff Date**

The cutoff date for the AHA's official block at all hotels is Friday, December 18, 2015. After this date, remaining inventory in each hotel's block will be released and rooms will be available at the AHA's convention rates on a space-available basis at the time of reservation. If hotel blocks sell out, the AHA will secure additional hotel rooms and post details on the AHA website.

#### Accommodations for Persons with Disabilities

The information that follows is provided to assist AHA annual meeting attendees with disabilities in obtaining the reasonable accommodations they require. Please refer to this information when making hotel reservations or arrangements to participate in program sessions and other events. In particular, guests should advise the hotels about specific needs when making room reservations.

All hotels have accessible lobbies, and several have autoslide doors. Thresholds and doormats are in compliance with American with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations and door-service personnel are available at most properties. Lobbies have marble floors and/or low-pile area carpeting. All hotels have accessible registration desks or provide clipboards to guests to complete registration documentation. Elevators connect all levels of each hotel. Each elevator has a wheelchair-accessible keypad, Braille numerals beside each control button, and audible direction. Restrooms in lobbies and on meeting room floors are wheelchair accessible and have tactile signage.


All hotels have accessible guest rooms. The number of such rooms at each property is noted below. Among other amenities, these rooms feature wheelchair-accessible doors, lever door handles, security peepholes, ample room space, grab bars in restrooms, low sinks with insulated pipes, accessible towel racks, and accessible mirrors. The following auxiliary aids are available at most properties: flashing fire alarm, doorbell, and telephone; vibrating alarm clock; closed-caption decoders; Braille signage; and TDD telephones.

#### Hilton Atlanta

*Parking*: An elevator from the self-parking garage leads directly to the hotel lobby. Self-parking spaces are based on availability and are not guaranteed. Ceiling height limit is 6 feet. For oversized vehicles only, valet parking service is available. Valet parking service is available in front of the hotel only. Valet parking spaces are based on availability and are not guaranteed. Special car parking spaces and wheelchair van parking is available nearby at other parking lots and garages that are not operated by Hilton Atlanta.

*Guest rooms*: The hotel has 35 ADA-approved accessible rooms, two on floors 9 through 25, and one room on the 26th floor. ADA rooms are based on availability and are not guaranteed.

*Meeting rooms*: The meeting rooms are located on floors 1, 2, 3, and 4 and are all accessible. The Crystal Ballroom and Crystal Executive Boardroom, which is bi-level, are equipped with one wheelchair lift.

Restaurants: Southern Elements, Nikolai's Roof, and Trader Vic's are accessible.

#### Atlanta Marriott Marquis

*Parking*: Hotel staff at the Peachtree Center Avenue valet parking entrance will accommodate ADA guests.

Guest rooms: Forty wheelchair-accessible guest rooms are available.

*Meeting rooms*: The International, Marquis, Lobby, and Atrium levels are all accessible.

*Restaurants*: Sear, High Velocity, Pulse Bar, Starbucks, and the M Store are accessible.

#### Hyatt Regency Atlanta

*Parking*: Guests should arrive at the Motor Entrance Lobby on Peachtree Center Avenue at the rear of the hotel for valet staff to assist with accessible parking.

*Guest rooms:* 36 mobility accessible guestrooms, including 17 with rollin showers, 35 hearing impaired accessible guestrooms, 5 also with mobility accessibility, and auxiliary assistive devices are available on request. The fitness center is fully accessible via the Radius Tower elevators from the lobby level. The pool deck is fully accessible with a pool lift permanently installed. *Meeting rooms:* Meeting rooms are in the International Tower and the Conference Hall Level and are accessible.

*Restaurants*: SWAY Restaurant and 22 Stories Lobby Bar are accessible. Braille menus are available.

#### Accessible Transportation

MARTA is dedicated to making public transportation accessible to everyone, regardless of disability. All 91 bus routes are equipped with wheelchair lifts or kneeling capabilities. In addition, MARTA operates mobility services for qualified riders. MARTA provides **ADA Complementary Paratransit Service** to eligible persons with disabilities who are unable to board, ride, or disembark from an accessible vehicle in MARTA's regular bus or rail services. Service is provided with special lift-equipped vans on a curb-to-curb, shared-ride basis. Certified individuals having a MARTA ADA Photo Identification Card may call the MARTA Mobility Reservation Office at **(404) 848-5000** Monday through Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

**Checker Cab** (www.atlantacheckercab.com/) provides accessible taxi service. To reserve a fully accessible van, call (404) 351-1111 around 24–48 hours in advance.

#### Service Animals Welcome

The American Historical Association is committed to making the annual meeting accessible. Service animals are welcome at all events, sessions, and venues. The ADA protects the right of people with disabilities to be accompanied by trained service animals in public places. Remember, not all disabilities are visible and service animals are not required to wear special equipment or tags. Service animals are working and should not be distracted without permission.

#### Fragrance

Please help us to accommodate attendees who are sensitive to fragrances by refraining from wearing scented products.

#### Sign Interpreting

Members with hearing impairment who will need sign-interpreting service at the AHA annual meeting must notify the AHA Headquarters Office and register for the meeting by December 1, 2015. The request should include the sessions they plan to attend. The AHA will, with the assistance of the Registry of Interpreters, secure the services of appropriate interpreters. The AHA will assume the cost for up to nine hours of sign language interpreting service or a maximum of \$400 per member, whichever is less.

An interpreter may also be provided upon request for the presidential address (Friday, January 8) and the annual business meeting (Saturday, January 9).

Assistive listening devices are also available on request.

#### **Transportation to Atlanta**

#### Airport

The Atlanta area is served by the Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport (ATL), which is located 10 miles from downtown Atlanta. To review a terminal layout, see **www.atlanta-airport.com**. Free trains run approximately every two minutes between all concourses and the terminals.

#### **Mass Transit**

Atlanta's mass transit system is **Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority** (MARTA) (www.itsmarta.com; 404-848-4711 for schedule information). From the baggage-claim area follow "Ground Transportation/MARTA" signs to the MARTA station inside the terminal. All trains head downtown, so any train you take is the right one. Take MARTA to the Peachtree Center station, located just two blocks from the Hilton and one block from the Marriott and Hyatt. The ride downtown takes about 20 minutes.

All riders must have a Breeze Card to access the bus or train. Breeze fare can be purchased for \$2.50 at a Breeze Vending Machine located in all 38 rail stations or at any of the MARTA Ridestores (Airport and Five Points).

Train frequencies and service hours are as follows:

Weekdays: 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.: 10 minutes all lines

Weekdays: 7 p.m. to 1 a.m.: 20 minutes all lines

Weekends: 20 minutes all lines

#### Taxi Service

Taxis are readily available at designated areas at hotels and at the airport outside baggage claim areas. At the airport, exit the terminal and walk to the Ground Transportation Center. The trip downtown takes approximately 20 minutes, longer in rush hours.

There is a \$30 flat rate from the airport to downtown (\$2 charge for each additional person).

#### Van Service

**Super Shuttle (www.supershuttle.com;** 1-800-622-2089x2; **atlsales@supershuttle.com**) offers service from the ground transportation area of the airport to all of the major downtown hotels for \$16.50 per person one way or \$28 round trip.

#### Arriving by Train

Amtrak's Crescent line stops in Atlanta's Peachtree Station (1688 Peachtree Street NW; 404-881-3060), with daily service.

#### Parking at the Hotels

All hotels have parking available at rates ranging from \$22 to \$39 overnight.

#### **Meeting Registration**

Advance registration must be completed by midnight on December 18, 2015. After that, onsite rates will apply. Registration materials, including badges, will be distributed at the meeting during registration hours, posted on page vi.

Everyone attending the meeting is expected to register. Admission to the Exhibit Hall, Career Fair, Job Center, and Internet Center requires a registration badge.

#### **Refund Policy**

Advance registrants who are unable to attend the meeting may request a refund of their registration fee. Cancellations and refund requests should be submitted in writing and postmarked (or e-mailed) by **December 18, 2015**. Refunds will be processed less a \$20 administrative fee. No refunds will be issued for requests postmarked or e-mailed after December 18, 2015. Refunds will not be given for no-shows. 

The Martin Luther King National Historic Site was created by Congress in 1980 to "preserve, protect and interpret for the benefit, inspiration and education of present and future generations" the places where Martin Luther King Jr. was born; where he lived, worked, and worshiped; and where he is buried, while also interpreting the life experiences and significance of one of the most influential African Americans in the 20th century. The site is located on Auburn Avenue, once described by Fortune magazine as "the richest Negro street in America," the commercial, cultural, and spiritual center of Atlanta's African American community for much of the 20th century. Martin Luther King Jr. was born and raised on Auburn Avenue, and three generations of his family were pastors at Ebenezer Baptist Church, located just a block from the home in which King lived until age 12. The tour includes the King Birth Home; Ebenezer Baptist Church; the King Center for Nonviolent Social Change, where Martin Luther and Coretta Scott King are buried; and a permanent exhibition, Courage to Lead, at the National Park Service Visitor Center.

# Open Forum: Guidelines for the Professional Evaluation of **Digital Scholarship by Historians**

In order to respond in creative and responsible ways to exciting developments in digital scholarship in history, the AHA established a committee to produce a set of guidelines for the professional evaluation of digital scholarship by historians. The AHA adopted the committee's recommendations and the guidelines in June. This important document aims to provide departments and scholars with a basis for evaluating research and teaching that utilizes digital tools and methods, digital history projects and products, and to help them move toward giving professional credit for work of this kind.
