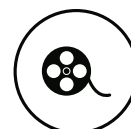

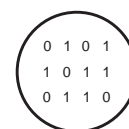

The 131st annual meeting of the Association will be held January 5–8, 2017, in Denver. More than 1,500 scholars will participate in the four-day meeting. In addition, more than 50 specialized societies and organizations have scheduled sessions and luncheons in partnership with the Association. AHA awards and honors will be announced on Thursday, January 5, followed by the plenary session. Patrick Manning, University of Pittsburgh, will deliver the presidential address on Friday, January 6.

## Making a Hotel Reservation

Attendees should reserve a room through the AHA's housing service, Experient. ## Reservation Dates

Reservations can be made by Internet or phone between September 14 and December 12, 2016. The last day to make or change reservations through the housing service is December 12, 2016. After that date, remaining inventory in each hotel's block will be released and rates are no longer guaranteed. After December 12, all reservations, changes, and cancellations must be made directly with the hotels.

## Credit Card Guarantee

All reservations must be guaranteed with a major credit card or deposit of one night's room rate and taxes. Cancellations must be made 72 hours prior to the scheduled arrival date or hotels will charge a cancellation fee of one night's room and tax.

## Accommodations for Persons with Disabilities

All meeting locations have accessible lobbies; several have autoslide doors. Thresholds and doormats are in compliance with American with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations and door-service personnel are available at most properties. Lobbies have marble floors and/or low-pile area carpeting. Elevators connect all levels of each property. Each elevator has a wheelchair accessible keypad, Braille numerals beside each control button, and audible direction. Restrooms in lobbies and on meeting room floors are wheelchair accessible and have tactile signage.

All hotels have accessible registration desks or provide clipboards to guests to complete registration documentation. All hotels have accessible guest rooms. The number of such rooms at each property is noted in the listing below. Among other amenities, these rooms feature wheelchair-accessible doors, lever door handles, security peepholes, ample room space, grab bars in restrooms, low sinks with insulated pipes, accessible towel racks, and accessible mirrors. The following auxiliary aids are available at most properties: flashing fire alarm, doorbell, and telephone; vibrating alarm clock; closed-caption decoders; Braille signage; and TDD telephones.

## Colorado Convention Center

All areas of the facility are wheelchair accessible. Electronic doors are located at all main lobby entrances. Three TTY phones are located throughout the facility. These telephones adhere to ADA code height requirements. All elevators are equipped with Braille signage. Additionally, restrooms and drinking fountains are ADA accessible. Attendees needing assistance with accessibility should speak to a guest services representative in the Atrium.

**Parking:** Parking is available at 19 designated ADA spaces, with more available upon request. The spaces, curb cuts, and garage accommodate vehicles with 96" and 156" clearance needs.

**Meeting rooms:** All levels of the Convention Center are accessible by elevator.

**Restaurants:** All dining areas meet ADA requirements and staff are willing and able to make reasonable accommodations for guests' needs.

**Other amenities:** The Convention Center is a large building and distances between locations can be considerable. The AHA will add seating areas outside the Mile High Ballroom and in the C Lobby near the Exhibit Hall. There is also seating available in the café space on the meeting room level.

**Golf cart service:** Complimentary golf cart service will run between the AHA Information Desk in the A Atrium and the elevators up to the Exhibit Hall in C Lobby during the following hours: Thursday, January 5 from 11 a.m.–7 p.m.; Friday, January 6 and Saturday, January 7 from 8 a.m.–6 p.m.; and Sunday, January 8, from 8 a.m.–1 p.m.

## Hyatt Regency Denver

**Parking:** ADA guests can either self-park or valet. If they wish to self-park there are a total of 22 disability stalls between all 3 levels of the garage. All disability stalls are located right next to the elevators that bring guests directly to the lobby. Valet parking staff can accommodate a limited number of larger vehicles.

**Guest rooms:** The hotel has 52 ADA-approved accessible rooms with roll-in showers or standard tubs with grab bars. Other accommodations in accessible rooms include low bed on frame, entry light flashes from doorbell, lower shelves in closet, and fire emergency strobe light.

**Meeting Rooms:** All meeting rooms on the 3rd and 4th floor are accessible. There are fully accessible elevators between all meeting rooms and floors.

**Restaurants:** Altitude, Strata, the lobby bar, and Peaks Lounge on the 27th floor are accessible.

### Sheraton Denver Downtown

**Parking:** There are accessible parking spots in the parking garage for guests who wish self-park. Valet parking can accept larger vehicles.

**Guest rooms:** The hotel has 57 ADA-approved accessible rooms. All king rooms are in the I.M. Pei Tower Building and all double queen rooms are in the Plaza Building. All accessible rooms have roll-in showers.

**Meeting rooms:** All the meeting rooms are fully accessible.

**Restaurants:** All of the hotel outlets are ADA compliant, including the Yard House.

**Other amenities:** There is an indoor accessible route between the towers via the

elevator off the lobby near the bell stand. Take the elevator to the Concourse Level and follow signage to the Tower Elevators. Guest may also cross from building to building via street crossing at the ground level.

### Grand Hyatt Denver

**Parking:** Valet parking is located in the covered garage adjoining the hotel. For guests with oversized vehicles, please note the height clearance of the garage is 6'9".

**Guest rooms:** 18 ADA rooms with roll-in showers/tubs and 26 hearing impaired rooms with flashing door bells.

*Meeting rooms:* All meeting rooms are ADA accessible by elevator.

*Restaurants:* Pub 17, the Fireside Lounge, and Starbucks are all located on the 1st level of the hotel. Menus are available in Braille on request.

*Other amenities:* Wheelchair-accessible health club, front desk, and concierge desk. The pool is accessible and provides a lift. However, the rooftop tennis court and running track are not ADA accessible.

## Denver Marriott City Center

*Parking:* All parking is by valet and ADA transport will be accommodated.

*Guest rooms:* 24 ADA-approved accessible rooms, 6 rooms with roll-in shower.

*Meeting rooms:* All meeting areas are accessible.

*Restaurants:* All restaurants are accessible.

*Other amenities:* A lift is provided from the main lobby to the upper lobby.

## Accessible Transportation

The Denver Light Rail, RTD's SkyRide buses, and the free 16th Street MallRide buses are all wheelchair accessible. Additional RTD Access-a-Ride service is available and must be reserved 1 to 3 days in advance. Please call 303-299-6560 to make a reservation. Make your request as early as possible, since Access-a-Ride trips are scheduled on a space-available, shared-ride basis.

SuperShuttle, Yellow Taxi, and Metro Taxi have wheelchair-accessible vehicles and can provide assistance for limited numbers with prior notice and reservation. The following companies will pick up with prior notice at Denver International Airport and provide specialized transportation:

## Sign Interpreting

Members with hearing impairment who will need sign-interpreting service at the AHA annual meeting must notify the AHA Headquarters Office and

register for the meeting by December 1, 2016. The request should include the sessions they plan to attend. The AHA will, with the assistance of the Registry of Interpreters, secure the services of appropriate interpreters. The AHA will assume the cost for up to nine hours of sign language interpreting service or a maximum of \$400 per member, whichever is less.

An interpreter may also be provided upon request for the presidential address (Friday, January 6) and the annual business meeting (Saturday, January 7).

## Airport

The Denver International Airport is 25 miles from downtown Denver and is connected to the city by light rail. Find up-to-date airport information at 303-DIA-TIPS or [www.flydenver.com](http://www.flydenver.com).

## Light Rail: University of Colorado A Line from Airport to Union Station

Denver International Airport now has a direct rail connection from the airport to Union Station in downtown Denver. From there, it is only a short ride on a free bus to the AHA meeting hotels. The trip from the airport to downtown takes 37 minutes.

To get to Denver Airport Station, follow signs to the Transit Center and proceed to the south end of the main terminal on Level 5.

Tickets may be purchased at the ticket vending machines located on the train platform using cash or credit cards. Fare from the airport to downtown is \$9.

Trains run every 15 minutes during peak travel times, and every 30 minutes off-peak.

## Taxi Service

Taxis are readily available at designated airport exits. There is a \$51 flat rate from the airport to downtown, plus a \$4.57 gate fee and \$5 for each additional stop. The gate fee does not apply to trips from downtown to the airport.

## Van Service

Super Shuttle offers service from the ground transportation area of the airport to all of the major downtown hotels for \$25 per person one way or \$40 round trip. See [historians.org/annual-meeting](http://historians.org/annual-meeting) to take advantage of a discount for AHA attendees.

## Parking

All hotels have parking available at rates ranging from \$37 to \$42 overnight. Parking at the Convention Center ranges from \$12 for 8 hours to \$25 for 24 hours. ## High Altitude Tips

Denver is located at high altitude, and the air is thin and dry. Drinking plenty of water, both before your trip and while in town, is the best way to adjust to the altitude—plan to drink about twice as much water as usual. Eating foods high in potassium can also help your body adjust. Remember that the effects of alcohol feel stronger and exercise more intense at high elevations. There is also less protection from the sun's rays.

## Meeting Registration

Everyone attending the meeting is expected to register. In addition, all US historians presenting at AHA sessions must be AHA members. Admission to the Exhibit Hall, Career Fair, Job Center, and Internet Center requires a registration badge.

## Refund Policy

Advance registrants who are unable to attend the meeting may request a refund of their registration fee. Cancellations and refund requests should be submitted in writing by **December 16, 2016**. Refunds will be processed less a \$20 administrative fee. No refunds will be issued for requests postmarked or

e-mailed after December 16, 2016. Refunds will not be given for no-shows. ## Internet Center

The AHA will make a Quiet Room available in the Convention Center's Room 112. The room will have free wireless Internet access. Although the room is of particular use to those on the job market, it is also available for all conference attendees as quiet places to await their next session or appointment, to temporarily escape the hubbub of the annual meeting, or to sit for a few minutes of quiet time.

## Nursing Mothers' Room

#### Tour 1: Exploring Early Jewish Denver History

Denver’s Jewish community dates back to 1859—the first year of the city’s permanent settlement—and the first Jewish synagogue was founded in 1874. Much like members of the general population, Jews migrated to Denver, first in search of wealth and new opportunities, and then later in search of health, as by the 1880s Colorado had earned a reputation as “The World’s Sanatorium.” This tour will highlight the area’s early Jewish history, with particular emphases on the settlement of first German Jews and then eastern European Jews, and on the major impact tuberculosis had on the growth of Denver’s Jewish and larger communities. Tour stops will include the Pearl Street Temple Emanuel building (1899), and the Auraria campus, which includes the Shearith Israel Synagogue (1903), the old Groussman’s Grocery (1906), and the Golda Meir House (1913). We will conclude with an extensive tour of the beautiful former campus of the Jewish Consumptives’ Relief Society (now the Rocky Mountain College of Art and Design), one of the best-known early tuberculosis sanatoria in the US.

Please note: The bus tour includes some walking, totaling about three city blocks. One stop includes a short staircase.

The artwork on view at the American Museum of Western Art represents a cross-section of paintings that survey the art of the American West from the early 19th century through the age of industrialization. During the relatively short period illustrated by this collection, the West was transformed from Indian territory unknown to most inhabitants of the eastern United States into a settled region. The Anschutz Collection surveys the development of American art as it pertains to the West and provides examples from all of the schools that contributed to that development. The museum occupies the historic Navarre Building, which was designed and built in 1880. Prior to its current use, it served as a school, a red-light hotel, a dining club/restaurant, and a jazz club. The American Museum of Western Art is only open to the public on Mondays and Wednesdays, so attendees will have no other opportunity to visit during the meeting.

The tour will cover highlights from the collection of the Denver Art Museum, the leading venue of its kind in the Rocky Mountain region. A wide range of galleries present paintings, sculptures, textiles, graphics, and crafts from premodern, modern, and contemporary Asia, Oceania, Africa, Europe, and the Americas. The museum boasts particular strength in the areas of Native American, Pre-Columbian, Spanish colonial, and Western art. Current special exhibitions cover topics including Japanese fashion design in the 1980s and 1990s, contemporary Japanese ceramics, and masterworks of the Venetian Renaissance. Participants will tour the museum with a docent, with the option to continue to explore the exhibits on their own after the tour.

Join us for a tour of Edgar Experimental Mine, a teaching mine operated by the Colorado School of Mines in Idaho Springs, located in a canyon at 7,500 feet carved out by Clear Creek, which supplies the water to the Coors brewery in Golden. Prospectors founded the town in 1859 during the early days of the Pike's Peak Gold Rush. The historic Edgar Mine—originally constructed in the 1870s—includes its original main tunnel connected to branches of tunnels dug by students over the previous half-century. The tour will take visitors through more than one-half mile of underground workings representing over 100 years of mine development. In addition, the tour will include a roundtable panel on Colorado mining history in a classroom inside the mine itself, followed

by happy hour and early dinner (or appetizers) at Tommyknocker brewery in downtown Idaho Springs, which will include a discussion about saloon culture and the Western gold rush. Participants will pay for their own food and drink. On the way to and from the site, visitors will enjoy spectacular views of the Rocky Mountains.

Thomas Andrews (University of Colorado at Boulder) will moderate the discussion with George Vrtis (Carleton College), Elizabeth Jameson (University of Calgary), and Elliott West (University of Arkansas). Issues to be discussed include mining and the environment, gendered dimensions of mining history, mining history in global context, beer on the mining frontier, working-class women in the West's saloons, and more.

Participants should wear closed-toed shoes with a good tread, warm clothes, and casual (mud and dirt friendly) attire; attendees will be provided hardhats at the mine site.

Please note: This bus tour requires participants to walk up a dirt road with a steep grade for a quarter mile; the tour and roundtable will take place in a confined underground space. Unfortunately, the mine is not wheelchair accessible.

If there is more than six inches of recent snowfall in Idaho Springs, participants will not be able to tour the mine but will meet in an alternate location. In the event of inclement weather, AHA staff will e-mail participants with further instructions. Return time of 7:30 p.m. is approximate.

**Tour 6: The “Harlem of the West”: Five Points and the African American History of Denver and the West***Colorado Convention Center, Room 103*

Five Points, dubbed “the Harlem of the West,” emerged as Denver’s first African American neighborhood around the turn of the 20th century. It remains the heart of the city’s African American cultural and historical identity to this day. Using library and museum visits and a walk along Five Points’ historic Welton Street, this tour will explore the history of African Americans in Denver and place that history in the wider context of the black American West. The tour will begin at the Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library, which houses collections and exhibits on black migration to the West and the cultural, social, political, and business history of Five Points, along with a rotating art gallery. We will then walk through the heart of Five Points, past landmarks like the Rossonian Hotel, once a major stop on the nation’s jazz circuit, to the Black American West Museum and Heritage Center, whose exhibits highlight the lives and experiences of African American ranchers, farmers, cowboys, and Buffalo Soldiers, among others. At the end of the tour, participants may choose to have lunch at the Welton Street Café, a longtime family establishment serving soul food and Caribbean jerk (lunch is not included in the price of the tour).

Please note: Transportation between the Convention Center and Five Points will be by light rail. The tour will involve an approximately eight-block walk between the library and the museum. The library and first floor of the museum are ADA-accessible, but the other floors of the museum are accessible only by stairs.

Described by many as the most anti-traditional of the abstract expressionists, Clyfford Still is credited with laying the groundwork for the movement. The Clyfford Still Museum now houses 95 percent of the artist's total output, making its collection the most intact body of work of any major artist. It contains approximately 825 paintings and over 2,300 works on paper.

In addition to the artworks, the museum is also home to the artist's archives of letters, sketchbooks, manuscripts, photo albums, and personal effects. The museum's rotating exhibitions, drawn almost exclusively from its extensive collections, illuminate both Still and the important period of American art history surrounding his lifetime. The exhibition during the AHA meeting is the largest mounted by the museum to date, and will highlight 260 paper works. Participants will tour the museum with a docent, with the option to enjoy the museum on their own after the tour.

### Tour 11: Niinenii-niicie: Exploring the Ongoing Indian History of Denver

Though it can be easy to overlook amidst the skyscrapers and suburban subdivisions, the entire Denver metro area sits on land that was expropriated from Arapahos and Cheyennes in the 1850s and 1860s. Through repeated treaty violations and bloody aggressions, most notoriously the Sand Creek Massacre of 1864, these tribes were systematically removed not just from the Denver area but entirely from Colorado Territory. Ever since, there has been a tendency in Denver to relegate Natives to a sort of ghosthood: people only of the past. But Native Americans never fully vanished as 19th-century thinking assumed they would—nor did the living legacies of the 1860s violence against them. On this tour, we will explore the persistent history of Indian people in the metro area—both their continued presence in the city, and the continuing relevance of their past. Our exploration will take us to a number of sites. At the State Capitol and its surrounding monuments, we will discuss the ways Sand Creek and Colorado's Indian history more broadly have been alternatively erased, mythicized, and memorialized.

At the Four Winds American Indian Center, a community center near downtown, we will discuss the experiences of Native Americans in Denver since World War II, including struggles for civil rights, housing, education, health, religious expression, and cultural preservation. Leading our tour will be David Halaas, retired former Colorado state historian and current consultant to the Northern Cheyenne Tribe; Tink Tinker (wazhazhe/Osage Nation), professor of Indian cultures and religions at Denver's Iliff School of Theology and longtime local spiritual and community leader; and Bill Philpott, history professor at the University of Denver.

This bus tour will involve a small amount of walking. The downstairs meeting room at the Four Winds American Indian Center is ADA accessible, but the main hall of the center is accessible only by stairs.

For millennia, people have lived, worked, and learned at the confluence of Cherry Creek and the South Platte River. Paleoindians and, later, Cheyennes and Arapahos called this area home. In 1858, amidst the Pikes Peak gold rush, a new wave of people occupied this ground, dispossessing the natives, initiating the era of Euro-American settlement, and giving rise to the new city of Denver. As the city grew, Auraria became an industrial, working-class, and multi-ethnic neighborhood. The 1960s brought another wave of displacement as urban renewal claimed the neighborhood, transforming it into the urban campus now shared by the University of Colorado Denver, Metropolitan State University, and the Community College of Denver. Fortunately, many historic buildings remain as traces of the pre-1960s heritage, including churches and an entire block of 19th-century houses and commercial structures.

- The Program Committee will only accept proposals for complete sessions.

### Poster Proposals

- The 132nd annual meeting will feature a poster session to allow historians to share their research through visual materials.
- Proposals for single, individual presentations may be submitted as posters.

The Program Committee welcomes proposals from all historians, whatever their institutional affiliation or status, as well as from affiliated societies, historians working outside the United States, and scholars in related disciplines. With the exception of foreign scholars and those from other disciplines, all persons appearing on the program must be members of the AHA. The Association encourages the representation of the full diversity of its membership at the annual meeting. Everyone participating in the annual meeting is expected to register for the meeting when registration opens in the fall.

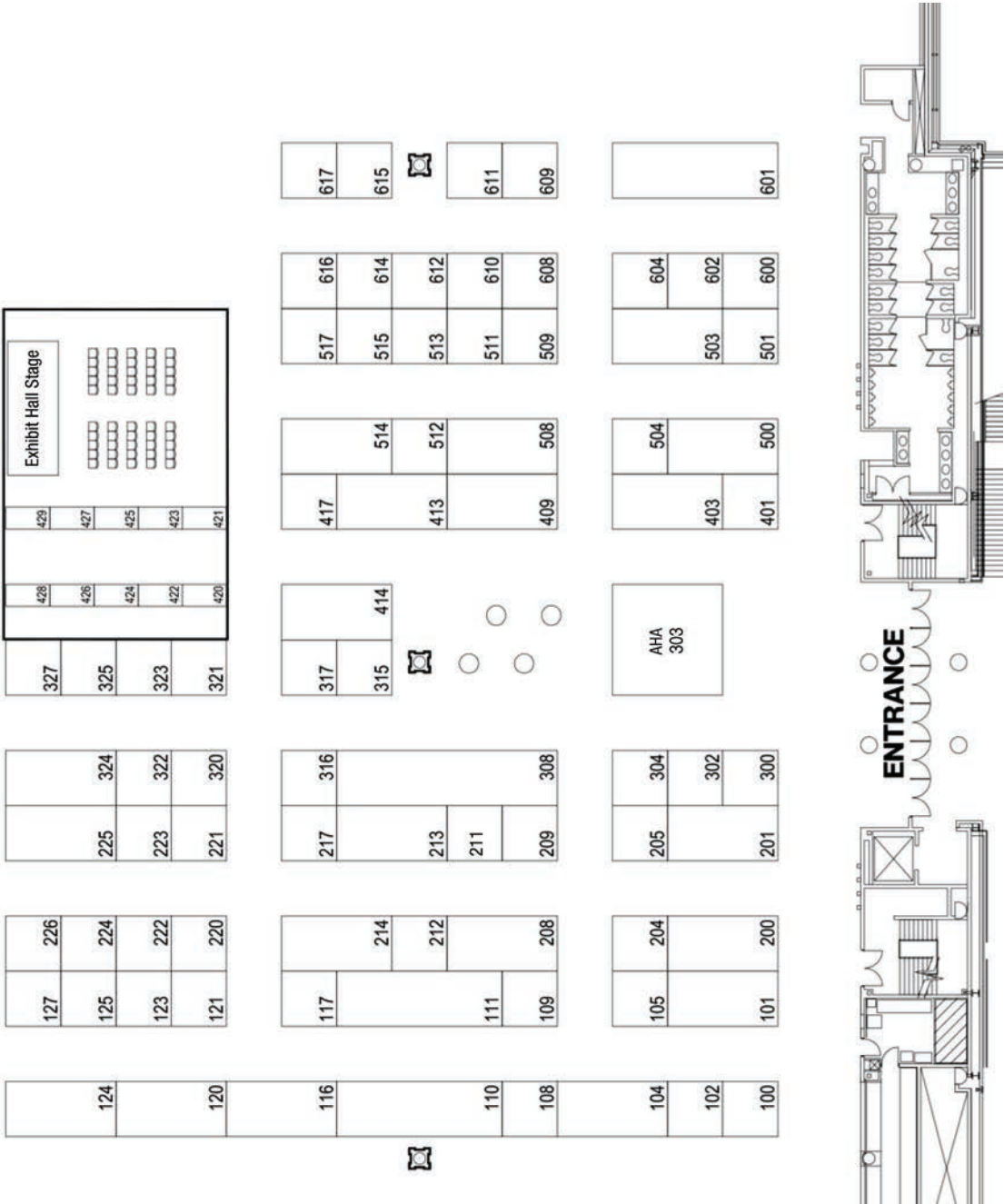
Although the annual meeting has a theme, the Program Committee does not consider proposals' relation to the theme in evaluating them.
