

General Information

he 133rd annual meeting of the Association will be held January 3-6, 2019, in Chicago. More than 1,500 scholars will participate in the four-day meeting. In addition, more than 50 specialized societies and organizations have scheduled sessions and events in partnership with the Association. AHA awards and honors will be announced on Thursday, January 3, followed by the plenary session. Mary Beth Norton, Cornell University, will deliver the presidential address on Friday, January 4.

Making a Hotel Reservation

Attendees should reserve a room through the AHA's housing service, Experient. Attendees will be able to make reservations online through a link on the AHA website or by calling toll free at 800-967-8852. International registrants may call 847-996-5832. Attendees interested in reserving suites should e-mail AHA@ experient-inc.com for more information about suite types and rates.

Reservation Dates

Reservations can be made by internet or phone between September 12 and December 10, 2018. The last day to make or change reservations through the housing service is December 10, 2018. After that date, remaining inventory in each hotel's block will be released and rates are no longer guaranteed. After December 14, all reservations, changes, and cancellations must be made directly with the hotels.

Credit Card Guarantee

All reservations must be guaranteed with a major credit card or deposit of one night's room rate and taxes. Cancellations must be made 72 hours prior to the scheduled arrival date or hotels will charge a cancellation fee of one night's room and tax.

Shuttle Bus

Your registration includes a free shuttle bus that will circulate between the hotels during meeting hours. Buses will depart every 20 minutes. There will be a dispatcher at each hotel to assist attendees with information. Buses will pick up and drop off passengers from the Hilton Chicago's 8th Street entrance and the Wabash Avenue entrance of the Palmer House Hilton.

Everyone attending the meeting must register. In addition, all US historians presenting at AHA sessions must be AHA members. Admission to the Exhibit Hall and Job Center requires a registration badge.

Refund Policy

Advance registrants who are unable to attend the meeting may request a refund of their registration fee. Cancellations and refund requests should be submitted in writing by December 14, 2018. Refunds will be processed less a \$20 administrative fee. No refunds will be issued for requests postmarked or e-mailed after December 14, 2018. Refunds will not be given for no-shows. 

connect all levels of each property. Each elevator has a wheelchair-accessible keypad, and Braille numerals beside each control button. Restrooms in lobbies and on meeting room floors are wheelchair accessible and have tactile signage.

All hotels have accessible registration desks or provide clipboards to guests to complete registration documentation. All hotels have accessible guest rooms. The number of such rooms at each property is noted in the listing below. Among other amenities, these rooms feature wheelchair-accessible doors, lever door handles, security peepholes, ample room space, grab bars in restrooms, low sinks with insulated pipes, accessible towel racks, and accessible mirrors. The following auxiliary aids are available at most properties: flashing fire alarm, doorbell, and telephone; vibrating alarm clock; closed-caption decoders; Braille signage; and TDD telephones.

Hilton Chicago

Parking: The self-parking garage has a height of 6'3" and the valet garage has a height of 8 feet.

Guest Rooms: The hotel has 77 ADA rooms distributed throughout the guestroom floors.

Meeting Rooms: All meeting rooms of the historic hotel are accessible via ADA lifts or elevators. Consult the hotel map for details.

Restaurants: All of the restaurants are located on the lobby level.

Other Amenities: The fitness center is accessible via ramp.

General Information

Palmer House Hilton

All areas of the facility are wheelchair accessible. Electronic doors are located at all main lobby entrances. All elevators are equipped with Braille signage, however, they do not have audible direction. Additionally, restrooms and drinking fountains are ADA accessible.

Parking: Self-parking has ADA spots available.

Guest rooms: There are 78 ADA rooms distributed evenly throughout the guest room floors, with an average of 4 rooms per floor.

Meeting Rooms: All rooms and floors of the historic hotel are accessible. Consult the hotel map for the elevator that serves a particular room. There are ADA lifts for wheelchairs in the Honoré and Empire Ballrooms. All other areas are accessible by elevator or ramp.

Restaurants: The restaurants have ADA seats available.

Other Information: There are ADA lifts for the pool and fitness center.

Accessible Transportation

The public transportation system in Chicago is accessible. Details are available at transitchicago.com/accessibility.

Wheelchair-accessible, ADA compliant taxis are available through a centralized dispatch, Open Taxis, at 855-928-1010.

Service Animals Welcome

The American Historical Association is committed to making the annual meeting accessible. Service animals are welcome at all events, sessions, and venues. The ADA protects the right of people with disabilities to be accompanied by trained service animals in public places. Remember, not all disabilities are visible and service animals are not required to wear special equipment or tags. Service animals are working and should not be distracted without permission.

Fragrance

Please help us to accommodate attendees who are sensitive to fragrances by refraining from wearing scented products.

Sign Interpreting

Members with hearing impairment who will need sign-interpreting service at the AHA annual meeting must notify the AHA Headquarters Office and register for the meeting by December 1, 2018. The request should include the sessions they plan to attend. The AHA will secure the services of appropriate interpreters. The AHA will assume the cost for up to nine hours of sign language interpreting service per member.

An interpreter may also be provided upon request for the presidential address (Friday, January 4) and the annual business meeting (Saturday, January 5).

Assistive listening devices are also available on request.

Sexual Harassment Policy

Recording Policy

The AHA and the press occasionally record sessions for use in broadcast and electronic media, and film or photograph public areas at the meeting. Registration, attendance, or participation at the meeting constitutes an agreement to the use of the attendee's image in photographs, video, audio, and electronic communications. Presenters who do not wish for their session to be recorded may opt out by contacting annualmeeting@historians.org. In order to encourage open debate and allow members to speak as freely as possible, the AHA does not permit audio or video recording of its business meeting. Anyone who wishes to conduct audio or video recording must obtain permission from participants in advance. The AHA is not responsible for unauthorized recording but does reserve the right to revoke registration of anyone who records sessions without appropriate permissions.

Live Tweeting

To facilitate virtual conversations arising from the annual meeting, the AHA encourages attendees to live tweet using **#AHA19**. Participants are encouraged to share their Twitter handles. Speakers presenting material that they do not wish to be live tweeted should make a request to the audience at the beginning of their presentations.

Quiet Room

The AHA will make a Quiet Room available in the Hilton Chicago's Mobley Room. The room will have free wireless Internet access. Although the room is of particular use to those on the job market, it is also available for all conference attendees as a place to sit for a few minutes of quiet time.

All-Gender Restrooms

Nursing Mothers' Room

Tour 1: Tour of Polish American Churches and Neighborhoods in Chicago

As Polish immigrants began arriving in Chicago in large numbers in the 1880s, they established a settlement around the Roman Catholic parish of Saint Stanislaus Kostka, located northwest of Chicago's downtown. Within two decades, Saint Stanislaus became the largest Catholic parish in the world, offering services that provided for the social, political, and religious needs of immigrants from the womb to the tomb. Saint Stanislaus became the nucleus for large Polish parishes built nearby that became known as the Polish Downtown.

The tour begins with the magnificent churches and tenement districts of Polish downtown, which since the 1980s has gentrified and become known as Bucktown. The tour travels northwest along Milwaukee Avenue to the areas of secondary settlement. The transition to the outlying bungalow districts of the city marked a dramatic shift in residential forms and the uses of urban space.

The tour examines the transformation of European religious cultural practices in an American environment and the role which residential dispersion played in the maintenance and adaptation of cultural practices for immigrants. The tour will also discuss the limitations of Progressive reformers critiques and frequent misrepresentations of immigrant Catholic communities.

In the *Karkomi Holocaust Exhibition*, the history of the Holocaust is told through the belongings, photographs, historical records, and stories of local survivors and witnesses. *Stories of Survival: Object. Image. Memory* uses personal artifacts brought to America to tell the stories of survivors of the Holocaust and genocides in Armenia, Bosnia, Cambodia, Iraq, Rwanda, South Sudan, and Syria. The Take A Stand Center includes the groundbreaking *Abe & Ida Cooper Survivor Stories Experience*, featuring interactive holographic technology. Other highlights of the permanent exhibition include the Goodman Upstander Gallery, highlighting 40 change-makers working toward civil, social, economic, health and environmental rights; the Take A Stand Lab, which explores how to raise awareness, give, advocate, and participate; and the Act of Art Gallery, which features citizen artistry as a response to human rights issues.



On October 22, 1963, more than 250,000 students boycotted the Chicago Public Schools to protest racial segregation. Many marched through the city calling for the resignation of School Superintendent Benjamin Willis, who placed trailers, dubbed "Willis Wagons," on playgrounds and parking lots of overcrowded black schools rather than let those students enroll in nearby white schools. Blending unseen 16mm footage of the march shot by Gordon Quinn with the participants' reflections today, '63 Boycott connects the forgotten story of one of the largest northern civil rights demonstrations to contemporary issues around race, education, school closings, and youth activism.



Chicago's public high schools are monuments to evolving ideas about the proper form and function of urban education. This tour of three public high schools on Chicago's west side will explore what the history of urban education and school architecture tell us about Chicago's changing neighborhoods, exploring how urban, social, and educational history can be read in the built environment.

The tour begins at the former Lucy Flower Technical High School for Girls (now Al Raby High School), a vocational school for girls that taught traditional female trades and home economics to an increasingly African American student body during the 20th century. Lucy Flower's history and architectural features, including WPA murals, recently earned it a place on the National Register of Historic Places. The tour then moves to the 100-year-old Carter Harrison Technical High School (now Maria Saucedo Scholastic Academy), which was the city's only coed technical school and offered classes led by both public school teachers and trade unionists. In the 1960s, Harrison's location on the color line made it a stage for youth revolt, including a mass walkout by black and Chicano students in 1968. The tour concludes at the city's first integrated magnet high school, Whitney Young Magnet High School, a modernist campus and academic flagship constructed in 1974 during an era of intensive urban renewal on Chicago's Near West Side.

The Mungellos (pronounced *mun-JEL-os*) were Italian-American children of Vesuvius. Raffaele was a builder, Marianna was a businesswoman, Filippo died in a gang murder in Pittsburgh. They fled the threats of the Black Hand, going to a booming coal-mining town and opening movie theaters. Dominic graduated from college during the Great Depression. The shadow of the gang pursued them, leading to labor disputes and arson which destroyed their new theater. On the East and West coasts, Evelyn and Marianne had simultaneous backstreet affairs with powerful and wealthy men. There was a murder trial for the questionable death of an adopted son from El Salvador. At Berkeley, David had an adulterous same-sex love affair with the New Left radical and national SDS leader Carl Wittman. The author gives a personal account of how homophobia caused Wittman to withdraw from SDS to write The Gay Manifesto (1969) and become a leader in the Gay Liberation movement. The Mungello family's love affairs projected them up the ladder of American success as they damned one another to their deaths. This is a true story.

Applied History Course Development Grant Opportunity

The Stanton Foundation is accepting proposals from tenured and tenure-track faculty to create new case-based undergraduate courses in U.S. history. The goal of these courses is to prepare students to think about the major issues related to U.S. vital interests that they will encounter during their lifetimes as citizens.

What is a "case-based applied history" course?

It is a course taught through a rich collection of cases drawn from the historical record to give students more context when thinking about current issues, making them more informed consumers of news and more responsible civic decision makers. Issues such as immigration, business regulation, international alliances, and income distribution that the U.S. confronts repeatedly, and with varying approaches and outcomes are examples of possible course topics.

What are the minimum requirements for the course?

The course must be a semesteror quarter-long offering; preference is given to larger courses. The department chair, and in some cases the dean of the division, must support the course.

All historians are welcome and encouraged to submit proposals. The AHA also invites historically focused proposals from colleagues in related disciplines and from AHA affiliated societies. The Program Committee will consider all proposals that advance the study, teaching, and public presentation of history.

The Association seeks submissions on the histories of all places, periods, people, and topics; on the uses of diverse sources and methods, including digital history; and on theory and the uses of history itself in a wide variety of venues.

We invite proposals for sessions in a variety of formats and encourage lively interaction among presenters and with the audience.

Session Proposals

Sessions last for 90 minutes. Most sessions will be limited to four speakers plus a chair. The Program Committee will accept proposals for complete sessions only. We encourage organizers to build panels that bring together diverse perspectives.

Poster Proposals

The meeting will feature a poster session to allow historians to share their research through visual materials. Proposals for single, individual presentations may be submitted as posters.

The Program Committee welcomes proposals from all historians, whatever their institutional affiliation or status, and historians working outside the United States. With the exception of foreign scholars and those from other disciplines, all persons appearing on the program must be members of the AHA, although membership is not required to submit a proposal.
