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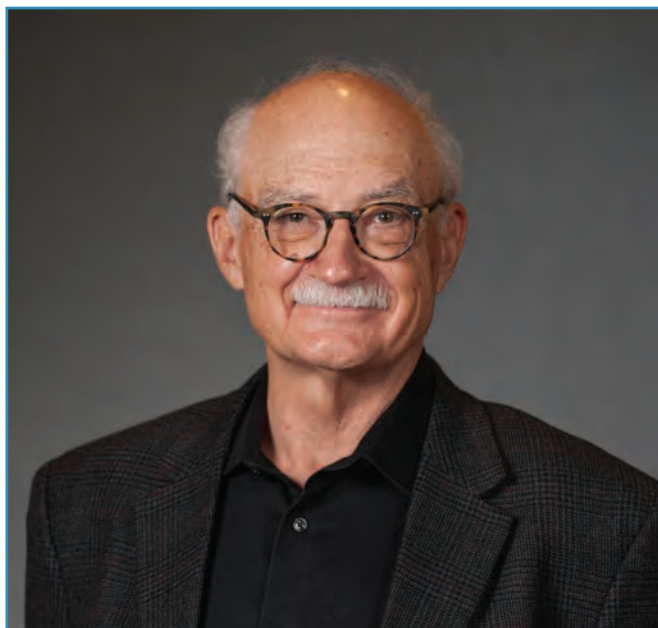

Making a Hotel Reservation

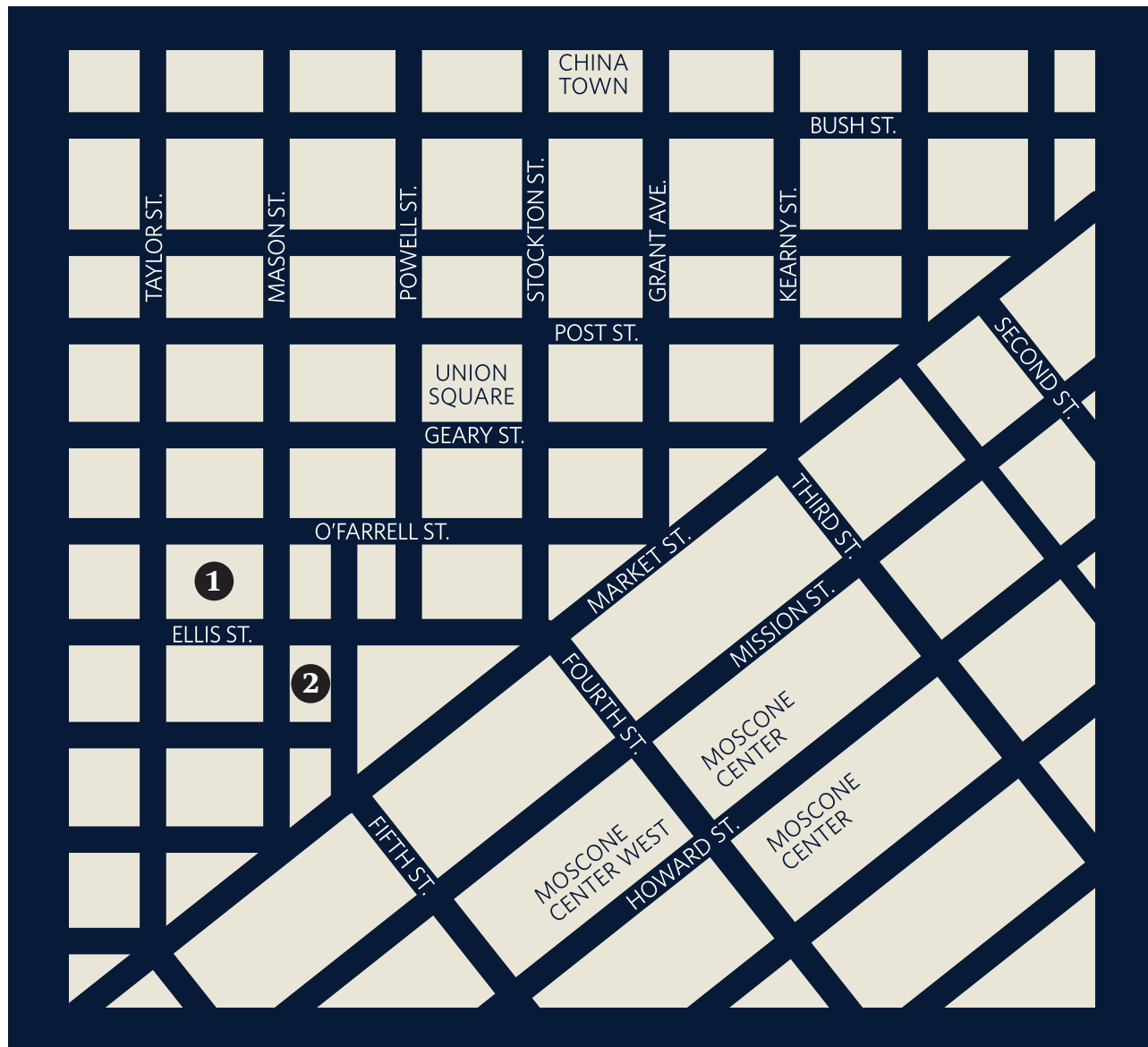

Health and Safety

The AHA and our meeting hotels are working together to follow Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines to make attendance at the meeting as safe as possible. We expect that all attendees will have up-to-date vaccinations at the time of the meeting. Attendees should comply with any mask and social distancing rules and guidelines established by the AHA, which will follow the guidance of the CDC as well as any additional requirements set by the conference hotels and the local government. Refund Policy

Advance registrants who are unable to attend the meeting may request a refund of their registration fee. Cancellations and refund requests should be submitted by **December 15, 2023**. Refunds will be processed less a \$20 administrative fee. No refunds will be issued for requests received after December 15, 2023. Refunds will not be given for no-shows. Cancellations and refund requests should be emailed to ltownsend@historians.org. Proof of payment may also be required.

Accessibility Information

All meeting hotels have accessible lobbies with at least one entrance with auto-slide doors; door-service personnel are available at other entrances. Thresholds and doormats comply with American with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations. Lobbies have marble floors and/or low-pile area carpeting. Elevators connect all levels of each property. Each elevator has a wheelchair-accessible keypad. Elevators either have audible announcements or Braille numerals beside each control button. Restrooms in lobbies and on meeting room floors are wheelchair accessible and have tactile signage.

All hotels have accessible registration desks or provide clipboards to guests to complete registration documentation. All hotels have accessible guest rooms. The number of such rooms at each property is noted below. Among other amenities, these rooms feature wheelchair-accessible doors, lever door handles, security peepholes, ample room space, grab bars in restrooms, low sinks with insulated pipes, accessible towel racks, and accessible mirrors. The following auxiliary aids are available at most properties: flashing fire alarm, doorbell, and telephone; vibrating alarm clock; closed-caption decoders; Braille signage; and TDD telephones.

Hilton San Francisco Union Square

The entrance at Mason Street has an auto-opener, and the entrance in the garage is fully accessible. The entrance at 333 O'Farrell Street does not have auto-openers.

Parking: Valet parking only; contact the hotel about possible accommodations.

Guest Rooms: The hotel has 28 accessible rooms, of which 21 have roll-in showers.

Meeting Rooms: All meeting rooms are accessible. Access to the Yosemite rooms is via the Tower 2 elevators or wheelchair lift from the grand ballroom level. Use the Tower 3 elevators to access fourth and sixth floor meeting rooms. Accessible restrooms are located on the lobby, ballroom, and Grand Ballroom mezzanine levels.

Hilton Parc 55 San Francisco

The entrance at Cyril Magnin Street and Eddie Street has an auto-opener. Please note that the entrance at Mason Street and Ellis Street has stairs, with a lift for wheelchair access.

Parking: Valet parking only; contact the hotel about possible accommodations.

Guest Rooms: The hotel has at least 10 accessible rooms, all of which have roll-in showers.

Meeting Rooms: All meeting rooms are accessible.

Accessible Transportation

Many of the region's BART and Muni stations for rail, subway, trolley, or bus are wheelchair accessible. All BART stations are wheelchair accessible, with elevators or ramps at all stations and barrier-free boarding. Every bus has a lift or ramp that can be lowered to street level.

Wheelchair accessible, ADA compliant taxi vans with rear entry wheelchair ramps are available within the San Francisco metropolitan area and at San Francisco International Airport.

Service Animals Welcome

The American Historical Association is committed to making the annual meeting accessible. Service animals are welcome at all events, sessions, and venues. The ADA protects the right of people with disabilities to be accompanied by trained service animals in public places. Remember, not all disabilities are visible and service animals are not required to wear special equipment or tags. Service animals are working and should not be distracted without permission.

Sign Interpreting

The AHA will assume the cost for up to nine hours of sign language interpreting service per attendee.

Child Registration Policy

Parents and guardians whose children, 15 years old and younger, will accompany them to the meeting may bring their own child into the Exhibit Hall at no extra charge. Business Meeting

The AHA Council, divisions, and committees will report to the Association at the annual business meeting. Reports are subject to discussion and appropriate motions relating to them. Resolutions on other matters for the business meeting will be handled as follows: Resolutions must be in proper parliamentary form; must be signed by members of the Association in good standing and by at least 2% of the total Association membership as of the end of the previous fiscal year (227 people); must not be more than 300 words in length including any introductory material; and must deal with a matter of concern to the Association or to the discipline of history. Such resolutions must be in accord with the Association's *Guiding Principles on Taking a Public Stance* (historians.org/public-stance). Organizers of resolutions are encouraged to consult with members of the AHA Council prior to the submission deadline for guidance on adherence to AHA constitution and bylaws. Resolutions must be submitted in electronic format to president@historians.org by **October 1** and include the name(s) and contact information for the resolution organizers.

Only AHA members and others who receive permission from the Council may attend the business meeting. Please confirm in advance that your membership is up to date.

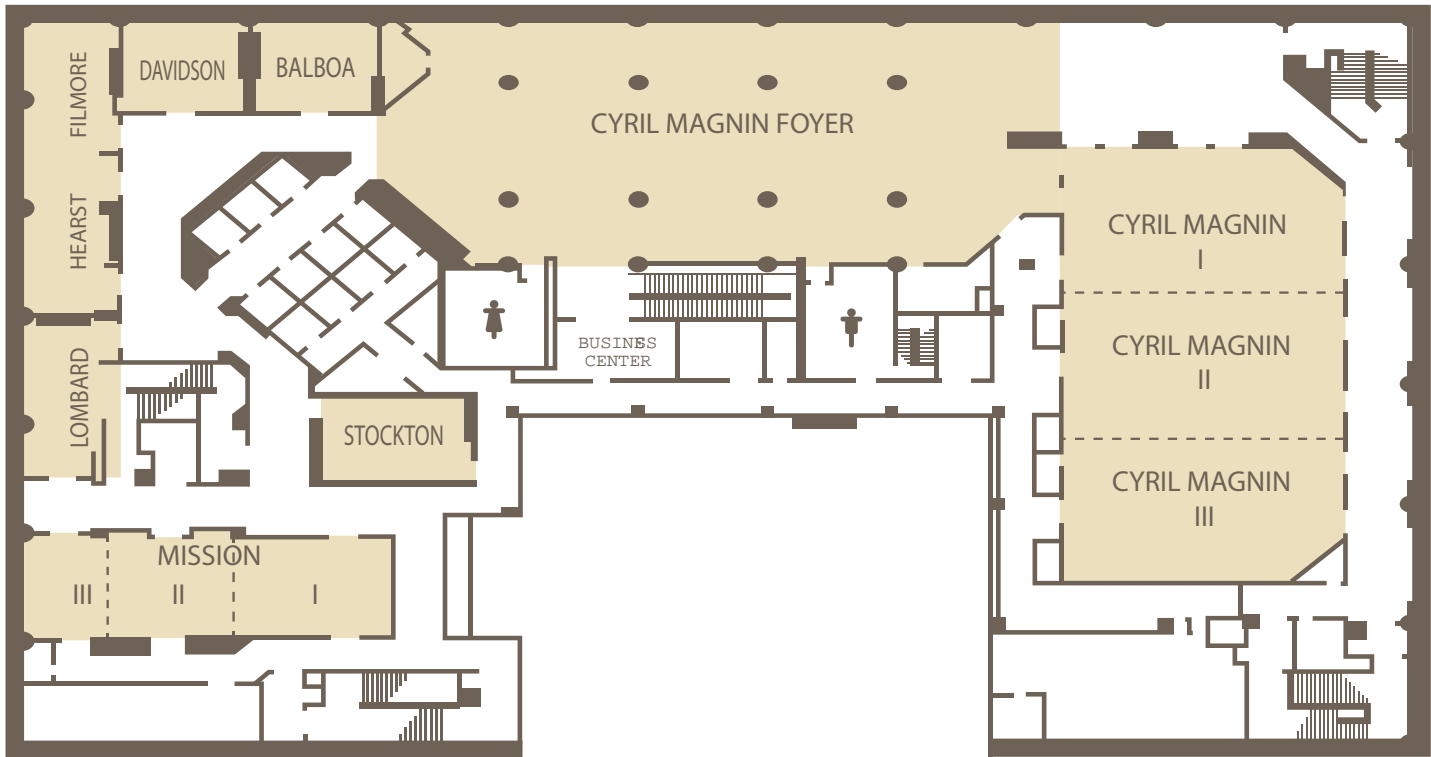
