

The 139th annual meeting of the Association will be held January 8–11, 2026, in Chicago, Illinois. More than 1,500 scholars will participate in the four-day meeting. In addition, 40 specialized societies and organizations have scheduled sessions and events in partnership with the Association.

Land Acknowledgment

We acknowledge that we are gathered on land that intersects with the ancestral homelands of several tribal nations: the Neshnabék: the Potawatomi, Odawa, and Ojibwe Nations; the Illinois Confederation: the Peoria and Kaskaskia Nations; and the Myaamia, Wea, Ho-Chunk, Sauk, and Meskwaki Nations. The Menominee, Kickapoo, and Mascouten Nations also call the region of northeast Illinois home. Indigenous people continue to live in this area and celebrate their traditional teachings and lifeways. Today, Chicago is home to one of the largest urban Indigenous communities in the United States, and this land remains an important place for Indigenous peoples. Making a Hotel Reservation

Reservation Dates

Reservations can be made online or by phone between September 15 and December 17, 2025. The last day to make or change reservations through the housing service is December 17, 2025. After that date, remaining inventory in each hotel's block will be released and rates are no longer guaranteed. After December 22, all reservations, changes, and cancellations must be made directly with the hotels.

Credit Card Guarantee

All reservations must be guaranteed with a major credit card valid through February 2026. Shuttle Bus



Reserve a hotel room in the AHA block through the AHA housing service before registering for the meeting and receive a \$50 discount off meeting registration. (You will not receive a discount refund if you register before booking a room.) Register online at historians.org/register.

Advance registration must be completed by midnight on December 15, 2025. Thereafter, onsite rates will apply. Registration materials, including badges, will be distributed at the meeting during registration hours, posted on page vi.

Everyone attending the meeting must register. In addition, all US historians presenting at AHA sessions must be AHA members. Admission to the Exhibit Hall requires a registration badge.

Refund Policy

Advance registrants who are unable to attend the meeting may request a refund of their registration fee. Cancellations and refund requests should be submitted by December 15, 2025. Refunds will be processed less a \$20 administrative fee. No refunds will be issued for requests received after December 15, 2025. Refunds will not be given for no-shows. Cancellations and refund requests should be emailed to ltownsend@historians.org. Proof of payment may be required.

Health and Safety

The AHA and our meeting hotels are working together to follow public health best practices to make meeting attendance as safe as possible. We expect that all attendees will have been vaccinated for COVID-19 by the time of the meeting (and received a booster if possible). Attendees should comply with all health and safety rules and guidelines established by the AHA, the CDC, the conference hotels, and the local government. Masks are welcome for those that wear them. See historians.org/ampolicies for the latest information.

Accessibility Information

All meeting hotels have accessible lobbies with at least one entrance with auto-slide doors; door-service personnel are available at other entrances. Thresholds and doormats comply with American with Disabilities Act (ADA) regulations. Lobbies have marble floors and/or low-pile area carpeting. Elevators connect all levels of each property. Each elevator has a wheelchair-accessible keypad. Elevators either have audible announcements or Braille numerals beside each control button. Restrooms in lobbies and on meeting room floors are wheelchair accessible and have tactile signage.

All hotels have accessible registration desks or provide clipboards to guests to complete registration documentation. All hotels have accessible guest rooms. Among other amenities, these rooms feature wheelchair-accessible doors, lever door handles, security peepholes, ample room space, grab bars in restrooms, low sinks with insulated pipes, accessible towel racks, and accessible mirrors. The following

auxiliary aids are available at most properties: flashing fire alarm, doorbell, and telephone; vibrating alarm clock; closed-caption decoders; Braille signage; and TDD telephones. Additional information about accessible sleeping rooms is available through Maritz, the AHA's housing service.

Hilton Chicago

Service Animals Welcome

The AHA is committed to making the annual meeting accessible. Service animals are welcome at all events, sessions, and venues. Sign Interpreting

Attendees with hearing impairment who will need sign-interpreting service must notify the AHA and register for the meeting by November 1, 2025. The AHA will assume the cost for up to nine hours of sign language interpreting service per attendee.

An interpreter may also be provided upon request for the presidential address (Friday, January 9) and the annual business meeting (Saturday, January 10).

Child Registration Policy

Parents and guardians whose children, 15 years old and younger, will accompany them to the meeting may bring their own child into the Exhibit Hall at no extra charge. Attendees ages 16 and up must register at the appropriate registration rate. The AHA assumes that parents and guardians will provide appropriate supervision for their children.

Business Meeting

The AHA Council, divisions, and committees will report to the Association at the annual business meeting. Reports are subject to discussion and appropriate motions relating to them. Resolutions must be submitted to the office of the executive director by October 1, to allow time for publication. Resolutions must be in proper parliamentary form; must

be signed by members of the Association in good standing at the time of submission, and by at least 2 percent of the total Association membership as of the end of the previous fiscal year (213 people); must not be more than 300 words in length including any introductory material; and must deal with a matter of concern to the Association or to the discipline of history. Such resolutions must be in accord with the Association's *Guiding Principles on Taking a Public Stance* (historians.org/public-stance). Signatures in support of such resolutions must be collected no earlier than January 1 of the year in which the resolution is submitted. Resolutions submitted by the deadline, and meeting the criteria for consideration, shall be published in the November issue of *Perspectives on History*.

Only AHA members and others who receive permission from the Council may attend the business meeting. Please confirm in advance that your membership is up to date.

Affiliated Societies

A table in the Exhibit Hall has been set aside during normal hours for affiliated societies to display materials and to meet with members of the discipline on a rotating schedule. Check the online program for the schedule.

Organizing an Informal Meeting

The AHA has set aside space for small group conversations about historical and professional issues. The 1881 Pullman Car Works and Hotel Florence, located 15 miles and 30 minutes directly south of downtown Chicago, offer a rare chance to learn how historians, archivists, and curators interpret a massive 1880s industrial complex amid competing interpretations of what matters.

The tour will visit the unrestored 1881 Front Erecting Shops, the Rear Erecting Shops, and the recently rehabilitated Pullman Administration Building. The tour will explore the

1880s–1930s interchange between persons who came to Pullman from England, Prussia, Italy, Japan, and elsewhere and the Pullman Company's export of Chicago-built cars to Manchuria, Central and South America, South Africa, Italy, and England. If weather allows, the group will visit the car works' superintendent's restored house (now home to a coffee shop and house tour).

Please note: The tour will travel via public transit and walk to and from the 11th Street–Museum Campus Metra station. The Pullman station is not accessible, with approximately 100 steps. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding of how the people of Little Palestine transformed this corner of Chicagoland despite intergenerational displacement and dispossession, and wrote a chapter in the global history of the Palestinians.

What are K-12 students learning about US history?

The AHA's *American Lesson Plan* summarizes key findings from the most comprehensive study of secondary US history education undertaken in the 21st century.

In 2022, we launched a project to analyze what is actually happening in classrooms across the country. Are teachers distorting history or indoctrinating children? Careful research transcends the heat and noise surrounding history instruction and enables us to provide a helpful and reliable source of information to parents, administrators, legislators, journalists, historians, and the many other stakeholders invested in the future of public education.

The resulting report distills insights gathered during a two-year exploration of secondary history education. Combining a 50-state appraisal of standards and legislation with a nine-state deep-dive into local contexts, we commissioned a National Opinion Research Center survey of over 3,000 middle and high school US history educators, conducted long-form interviews with over 200 teachers and administrators, and collected thousands of pages of instructional materials from small towns to sprawling suburbs to big cities. The US education system—diverse, devolved, and divided—could never be captured by the blunt slogans that have dominated sensationalist media and drawn attention from even more careful observers.
